



MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING HELD ON Saturday, 3 March 2018

The CASSAR Eagle Chapter held its regular meeting at the Pala Mesa Resort, Fallbrook, California, on Saturday, 3 March 2018, with 17 attendees, including three prospective members.

After President John Huegel called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone, Frank Kebelman gave the invocation,

The attendees then recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag, and the SAR Pledge.

After the recess for breakfast, The President asked each member to introduce himself and his guest, as well as say something about their ancestor and where they were from.

The minutes were approved as emailed to the members of the Chapter.

Officers Reports:

The President explained how important it is for attendance confirmations to reach the Secretary prior to the Friday of the week before the meeting, so the President could give an accurate count to the Resort.

He asked for DAR update, to which Fay Bishop reported her chapter was featuring the prospective members in their March meeting, the other DAR members were either absent or had nothing to report.

Secretary Bill Bishop reported the Chapter has 15 prospective members and some of them are actively working on their applications. John Murphy's application has been submitted. The Registrar was not present at this meeting.

Treasurer Robert Martin reported the bank account remained the same as reported last month with no income or expenses during the month.

Steve Clugston appeared in a George Washington uniform and spoke at Massing of the Colors at Hollywood Hills Forest Lawn in February, but the Chapter did not have a color guard representation this year. The Eagle Continues



- Suspended high in the sky, an Eagle glides taking the elevated thermals for a ride; while. Below the female Eagle perches on a cliff caring for her fledging.



- **These Eagles** live among what is highest in this country.
- They fly higher than the flag waving below them and are a creative symbol.
- During the Vietnam Era I remember when protestors would tear down the American flag, but the Eagle at the top of the pole remained high.
- Did you know that an eagle knows when a storm is approaching long before it breaks? The eagle will fly to some high spot and wait for the winds to come. When the storm hits, it sets its wings so that the wind will pick it up and lift it above the storm. While the storm rages the eagle is soaring above it. The eagle does not escape the storm, it simply uses the storm to lift it higher. It rises on the winds that bring the storm.
- So, while storms arose during the Vietnam Era, the Eagle 'danced' above they wait the "But that upon the **LORD** storms. shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as EAGLES shall run. and not be thev weary; and they shall walk, and not faint"
- This is something to think about! If you don't want to mount up with wings of an Eagle, do you want to mire in the mud like a pig?

- The Earliest American Bald Eagle is from the Society of the Cincinnati by Pierre L'Enfant



- The Cincinnati Eagle

On June 19, 1783, the General Society of the Cincinnati adopted the Bald Eagle as its insignia. This date was one day short of the one year after Congress had adopted the Eagle as the seal of the United States. But, the suggestion of the ": Bald" Eagle as the Cincinnati insignia was made by Major Pierre L'Enfant, a French officer who joined the American Army in 1777, served in the Corps of Engineers, and later become a member of the Society, and laid out Washington, DC. He noted, in making his suggestion: "The Bald Eagle, which is peculiar to this continent, and is distinguished from those of other climes by its white head and tail, appears to me to deserve attention." In 1784, Major L'Enfant was commissioned to design the eagle.

Dears Come and Pears Go, but still the Hand of Alemories weave as the Eagle Chapter celebrates its first five years of existence (April 13, 2013 - April 13, 2018). by Wayne Rogers, the Historian for the Eagle Chapter.

The idea of an Eagle Chapter was considered long before the charter of the Eagle chapter. Wayne had been president of the Riberside Chapter three (3) times and wondered if he could start a chapter in Temecula which was growing tast with new members, and through his genealogy studies he found that his grandfather had started a SAR Chapter near Batavia, New York, 75 years earlier. His grandfather died during World War II and he never knew him.

This idea came to fruition when Ray Raser, San Diego Chapter and Duane Wheeler, a past So CASSAR Vice President came to him and asked if he would form a Chapter for southern Riverside County and Northern San Diego County, to provide for a Chapter that would involve inactive members of Riverside and San Diego Chapters because they could not attend these Chapters because of their meeting times.

Precedence, earlier chapter, similitudes, and Startups of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), bring wind and protection to our back by bringing back the Past (American Revolution) into the Future. (the more Chapters, the more participation, and the more affirmation in the Principles of Liberty and our Constitutional Republic despite more present growing complications, oppositions and spacious thinking, with the result the greater the number of Chapters must continue to offer and reward us as a Pation of Free Men.)

- Beginning in January 2013, announcements were sent out too many relatively inactive members for a get together meeting to preliminary form the Chapter in February 2013 at the Lawrence Welk Resort. Initially we gotten prospective members, which grew to eventually 20 members Ray Raser and Wayne Rogers went to to CASSAR Manager's meeting with the proposal

Our 1st Organizational SAR Chapter Meeting was

was at the Lawrence Welk Resort on February 2, 2013



Compatriot Wayne Rogers gave a power point presentation on George Washington's Aledical History and 1st in Public Health. Those originally in attendance were SAR members and visitors from Northern San Diego County and Southern Those attending were: Ray Raser (SD Chapter Registrar) and his wife, Gail, Jim Churchyard, PhD (of southern coast-orange & SD chapters, OFPA, Cincinnati) and his wife, Al; Robert Anderson; Dennis Brigham, and Wayne Jerome Rogers (from Temecula, Riverside SAR); Duane Wheeler from Murrieta, previous southern CA state SAR President and previous Palm Springs Chapter President); Joe Townsend, former marine, and Tom Johnston, both were prospective members); Gordon Kelly, previously from It Worth Texas, and a new SD member); Frank Kebelman, former marine and new SD member); Bill Hoge (Orange county SAR, past Republican Assembly Chairman), and his wife. Susan, and there was a total of three DAR members, who came with their husbands.

After the presentation by Wayne Rogers, we discussed the forming of a new SAR Chapter, as the Eagle Chapter. It was unanimously agreed upon.

We passed a list of those willing and capable of being members of this new chamber for a petition to CASSAR. We needed 10 members, which we have. They were as follows: Ray Raser, Wayne Rogers, Jim Churchyard, Robert Anderson, Gordon Kelly, William Hoge, Frank Kebelman, Dennis Bridgman, Duane Wheeler, and Dave Sanders. This will be submitted to CASSAR Secretary Ron Barker who will review this with the next CASSAR board.

Subsequently before the charter of the chapter 10 additional members were added, namely from the Raser family:

At this initial meeting we elected the following officers: Wayne Rogers as Charter President, Ray Raser as charter Vice President, Jim Churchyard, as Secretary, and Frank Rebelman, as treasurer. Since then, Jim Churchyard has agreed to be our webmaster, Dave Sanders, as our Historian, and Duane Wheeler as Advisor.

Subsequently, our officers eventually become: Wayne Rogers as President; Jerry Sayer, as Vice President, Joe Townsend, as Secretary, Gordon Kelly, temporary Treasurer; Jim Churchyard as webmaster; Dave Sanders as Historian, and Duane Wheeler as Advisor.


We discussed 501C status and application for a Chapter Charter. Duane Wheeler indicated he would donate \$200 to help start the chapter, and Wayne Rogers indicated he would donate \$100. Such donations would be made after we have 501C status. In August we obtained our EIN number from IRS.

We discussed creating our own by laws that would meet CASSAR by laws and ASSAR

We subsequently obtained approval with slight revision from CASSAR when we were chartered in April 2013.

We started with 10 members. The original signatures were as follows: Ray Raser, Wayne Rogers, Jim Churchyard, Robert Anderson, Gordon Kelly, William Hoge, Frank Kebelman, Dennis Bridgman, Duane Wheeler, and Dave Sanders. These signatures were submitted to CASSAK Secretary Kon Barker for the CASSAK Board of Alanagers meeting in April 2013. Between the original organizational meeting and the granting of charter of the Chapter on April 13, 2013, 10 more members were added, namely from the Raser family,

We received confirmation of our Eagle Chapter from CASSAR. April 13, 2013,



With the eventual Charter, the Eagle Chapter had approximately the following membership makeup:

- From the original 20 members we ended up with only 13 full paying members instead of the 20 members, who signed up: and then several soon became associates)
- additional 4 new members
- 11 associate or dual members

• 2 unpaid members were later dropped. from 2013

We had nearly as many associate or dual members as we had full members, which provide us with additional support and participation.

Our chapter has had a strong interest and involvement in genealogy. We looked forward to proving new members with ancestors, and possibly providing for associates to complete our mission of a nation of free men.

Early on we discussed 501C status and application for a Chapter Charter. Duane Wheeler indicated he would donate to help. Our initial Treasurer did not know how to file, and we had another Treasurer. We submitted and a received a federal EIA number in August. This Treasurer moved to Texas, so subsequently Wayne Rogers in October submitted EIA information charter and by laws to ISSAR and they submitted a form for our inclusion under the ISSAR 501 3 status.

A new transfer member initially considered in taking over the treasurer position but felt there may be some conflicting issues involved and decided not to take the position.

Subsequently Wayne Rogers had to indicated himself as the responsible party for the; Eagle Chapter, in place of earlier Treasurer as well as President. He subsequently submitted a form for a change of address and responsible party to the Federal IRS.

We did receive a notice for filing form 990-A to the old address; however, we got no response from Federal IRS that our letter of exemption for non-profit had been approved. (this later was discovered by making a telephone call

obtained from CAR Anza children of American revolution, representative.

Wayne initially thought we might be fined in our state filing efforts, because of our delay in getting notice into the State of California, However, the state has indicated it will be sending us a 'FTB number' for the state. We subsequently obtained a number.

Wayne learned (from past CAR President Barbara Wescott) of the 501c3 troubles that the de Anza Trail Children of the American Revolution (CAR) who had with

their 501c3 status, denied. Per their President and their CPA Treasure they were not only required to file \$100, for re-admission but were fined \$600, which took away all the money they had in their treasury.

Warne completed and submitted an initial registration form state of California office to the Attorney General, for registry of charitable trusts, to have a California filing name for the Eagle Chapter, for complete other state forms (e.g. 3500A). It was said by a CASSAR attorney, that submitting for 501c3 status can cost up to \$3,000. Per Federal IRS, receiving determination of its 501c3 status or tax exemption can take up to 2-3 months. It took me over 4 months, without a written determination of exempt status; however by making a telephone call (subsequently), it was determined that the Federal IRS has determined our status as a 501 C3 in Rovember 2013; this was about one month after receiving a letter from ASSAR we were considered an subordinate to them. . The state of California provided initially under Charities, our tax exemption, as well as completion of the 990 A form for 501 c3 from Federal exemption. Wayne worked with two other SAR Chapters as well as the CASSAR and ASSAR on this tax exemption, issue for This endeavor took consideration effort and time to complete. several months. One of our principle efforts the first year was obtaining a 501 c3 status

Once it was complete, our chapter was able to do business easier, until its original exemption nearly expired three years later, and another approach was made.

Initially we considered future Meeting(s), activates, events, and location(s), and time(s). We agreed upon the Lawrence Welk Resort, Canyon Grill, Patio Two, 10 AM the third Saturday of each month at 10 AM (which has subsequently been changed to as the 1st Saturday of the month).

We have subsequently agreed upon a color guard as Steve Clugston (associate) Wayne Rogers, Jerry Sayer, and Will Wishop. We have participated in Alemorial Day at Riverside National Cemetery, 4th of July Parade in association with DAR

Chapter; Constitution Day with two DAR Chapters,

Our 2nd meeting was in March 2013. Bill Hoge, past CA Assemblyman and insurance executive, presented on Genealogy: *Finding Orlando and who is George Hilles*? Wayne Rogers presided.

Our 3-rd. meeting was in April, and CASSAR VP Membership Phil Hinshaw came and gave a great presentation at our meeting and gave us many words of advice on forming a new SAR Chapter.



CASSAR VP Membership Phil Hinshaw. He indicated that 70% of new members leave the SAR. We need to keep them. We were chartered in April 2013, with 20 members. Of them we have kept 6 members

Subsequently to being chartered, we've had 6 meetings for the first year.

At each meeting we have an Invocation-; give Allegiance to the Flag and recite the SAR Pledge at the beginning of the meeting and recite the SAR recessional at the end of the meeting.

Since we have been chartered, we have subsequently obtained 4 additional members; 4 prospective members, and one associate. Many of our members are dual members with either the San Diego or Riverside Chapters.



At our last meeting October 5th, Associate and a Docent, Steve Clugston gave a great presentation on the Mexican American War.



Steve can play many roles (e.g. George Washington) and others (e.g. Abraham Lincoln, Robert E. Lee, etc.)



Our chapter name (Eagle Chapter) celebrates the bald eagle, the chosen symbol of the United States. It also has a local connection since, in 2013, a nesting pair of bald eagles is living in the Ramona grasslands a few miles east of where we meet. The Eagle is represented on the Seal of the United States, the Eagle is the medal of the *Society of the Cincinnati*; with Boy Scouts, it ranks as its publicized highest achievement, and the Eagle itself is a very noteworthy bird of symbolism: The Eagle is a symbol of our country.

So, we can also say with pride and joy that we belong to the Eagle Chapter of the CASSAR, because it symbolizes what is the highest and longest, requiring a mind to understand and a will to believe, when it needs to adapt and adapt to its environment, knowing the best is yet to come

"THE EAGLE NEWSLETTER" BEGAN AS THE EAGLE CHAPTER CHRONICAL OF THE CAIFORNIA SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (CASSAR)-before April 13th, 2013 of its acceptance by the CASSAR and NSSAR. The pre-Eagle newsletter started in January 2013 to announce its possibility, creation, formation, and development. Remembrance and history of the Eagle Chapter. somewhere in time, events, people and contests, from the past ultimately moves forward toward into the present and into the future, but to be unaware of what occurred before we were active, is always to remain as children, omissive; for what is worth current fabric, unless it is woven from the learning of the past by records of history (e.g. newsletters), or else the foundation and roots are lost, and the present may be without protection and the future become vulnerable to errors,, mistakes, reversals, repetition of

failures, skips from success, loss of understandings and wisdom. History is protection against repeating failures of the past and losses of information, practices, and findings, for future successes. Remembrance is prologue to the future. The farther back we investigate into the past, the further forward we may see into the future. Having history and remembrance in our existence is like having wind at our back as we move toward the future.

The Eagle chapter has published monthly newsletters before its Charter, with announcements of future meetings, photos of past events and other information on our activities. An REMEMBRANCE OBSERVATION of One of the Oldest World War II Veteran in Sun City California- March 5, 2018, Married 75 Years



I met Rex Finley, in the local donut shop. He was born in 1921 in West Virginia, and grew up in Ohio . He was Sergeant in Army, Communications in WWII (listening to Japanesee), and was in war with three brothers, who all returned home after the War. All his siblings are now dead.

Rex is 96 years of age, and has been married for 75 years. She is 94 years of age and was married at 17 years of age. They have 4 children, one died of cancer, 13 grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren and has a great great grand children. He retired in 1979 at age 56 years of age. He has been retired for more 38 years. He was a mail carrier for 32 years. He does not go to the Veterans Hospital, and he has two plots in the Riverside National Cemetery. He has a California Driver'slicense which says it will not expire until he is 100 years. Rex became a member of the World's Soft ball Hall of Fame, since 2010, when he was 89 years old and over 13 championship,

baseball America's sport -Field of Dreams.. He remembers when a wooden bat only cost \$1 as compared toay's aluminum bat that costs upwards to \$300. He started playing baseball when he was 13 yearsof age. And only retired playing baseball at 92 years of age. He began falling down after playing in the donut shop. He still goes to the donut shop and cup of coffee every day, but no more softball. This was a great moment for me to meet Sgt Rex Finley another 96 year old WWII veteran; after Lt Gen Wright passed at 96 years old, a-way a couple of years ago. Because I loved bringing him to a SAR Chapter meetings.

My name is Old Glory.

I fly atop the world's tallest buildings. I stand watch in America's halls of justice. I fly majestically over great institutes of learning.

I stand guard with the greatest military power in the world. Look up!

And see me! I stand for peace - honor - truth and justice. I stand for freedom I am confident - I am arrogant I am proud. When I am flown with my fellow banners My head is a little higher My colors a little truer. I bow to no one.

I am recognized all over the world. I am worshipped - I am saluted - I am respected am revered - I am loved, and I am feared.

I have fought every battle of every war for more than 200 years: Gettysburg, Shiloh, Appomattox, San Juan Hill, the trenches of France, the Argonne Forest, Anzio, Rome, the beaches of Normandy, the deserts of Africa, the cane fields of the Philippines, the rice paddies and jungles of Guam, Okinawa, Japan, Korea, Vietnam, Guadalcanal New Britain, Peleliu, and many more islands. And a score of places long forgotten by all but those who were with me. I was there. I let my soldiers -I followed them. I watched over them. They loved me.

I was on a small hill in Iwo Jima. I was dirty, battle-worn and tired, but my soldiers cheered me, and I was proud.

I have been soiled, burned, torn and trampled on the streets of countries I have

helped set free.

It does not hurt, for I am invincible. I have been soiled, burned, torn and trampled on the streets of my country, and when it is by those with whom I have served in battle it hurts.

But I shall overcome - for I am strong.

I have slipped the bonds of Earth and stand watch over the uncharted new frontiers of space from my vantage point on the moon.

I have been a silent witness to all of America's finest hours.

But my finest hour comes when I am torn into strips to be used for bandages for my wounded comrades on the field of battle,

When I fly at half-mast to honor my soldiers,

And when I lie in the trembling arms of a grieving mother at the graveside of her fallen son.

I am proud.

My name is Old Glory.

Dear God - Long may I wave.

Some brief examples of 'Revolutionary Patriots' by Wayne Rogers are as follows: Jonathan Chandler, Privateer CT (privateer captured and survived as POW aboard the Jersey Prison ship) & a Major in War of 1812, pension rejected, NY; Daniel Allen Sgt. (at Lexington), Ct; Peter Bain, Ensign, NY; John Betsinger a baker for Military, pension rejected; Nathaniel Ball, Pvt., MA; Elisha Bradley, PVT (lived to nearly 100 yrs.), MA; Joseph Brownell, PS, RI; Nathan Brownell, Assisted Rev. Spy, RI; Samuel Chandler, Sgt., CT, father of Jonathan Chandler); John Chedle, Sgt., VT; John Colby, PS, NH; Aaron Coe, Capt. MA at Ticonderoga and Saratoga, cared for invalids, father of Ithamar Coe, Pvt., MA, Peter Covert, Pvt, NJ (fought at Yorktown); Joseph Hadden, PVT, father of Smith Hadden fifer in war of 1812), NY; John Hadden, Capt. NY British confiscated Estate, lost one son in war and was father of Joseph Hadden. Sgt NY; Joseph Huntington, Lt, NH, had a pension; Timothy Hungerford, Ensign, Conn; Samuel Jerome, Sgt, MA and father of Levi Jerome, Pvt, MA, had a pension; Johannes Kessler, Soldier, at the significant Battle of Orkisiny, NY; Bastian Lesher, Ensign, NY; Ithamar Parsons, PS, MA; Edmund Rice, Pvt MASS(Died in the War from wounds); John Rogers, Pvt & Sqt, Continental Line New ork and NH Militia to Ticonderoga & again in War of 1812 (survived Scalping and Burning at the Stake), NH had a pension; Uriah Townsend, escaped as a Privateer, NY; Jonathan Whipple, Pvt., NH; Aaron Williams, Pvt (survived a hanging), NY; Lebbeus Ball, Captain and Major, MA (captured twice, escaped twice and twice officer of day at Valley Forge), wounded with musket ball to scalp, no

pension, no purple heart, given a military tombstone posthumorously, 200 years after he died.

Society of Cincinnati as my Propitious Captain Stephen Buckland, Conn-4 years in Artillery, captain of a crack continental artillery unit, resigned and became a Privateer Commander (Lt Colonel) of a several Privateer Ships but was captured after 2 years, he was put aboard the Jersey Prison Ship in New York Harbor, where he died.

Wayne Rogers' Sons of the Revolution, State of California patriot George Houseman, was a Hessian and British deserter, Joined the American Army, was in Colonel Willet's militia from 1781 to extraction in 1784. He had land bounty, and was First white settler in Orleans County, New York, where his wife was burned in a their cabin to death as the first whites there in War of 1812 from British and Indians; the local American Legion is named after Houseman in Lyndonville, NY.

Another Ancestor, unaccepted to the Society of the Cincinnati, is Colonel James Easton, who planned the first assault on British at Ft Ticongeroga at Easton's Tavern, in Pittsfield, MA, and later met up with Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys and Benedict Arnold with only his servant. Ethan Allen asked Colonel Easton to go back and tell Congress of their success, but Benedict Arnold wanted to have that privilege and asked for a dual with Easton. Easton was a popular leader of soldiers; but he died in poverty,.jJust before Congress ultimately okayed to pay him for his past services in the Revolutionary War. All four of his sons fought in the Revolutionary War; However Benedict Arnold was his life-long nemesis, Benedict wanted to dual him because Ethan Allen wanted him to report success at Ticongeroga, Benedict caused him to be jailed on the way to Philadelphia so he could not respond to illegal military charges made up by Benedict Arnold in Canada. Benedict may have been the hero at Saratoga, but he had a very Dark and mendacious hand in his dealing with other officers in order to succeed. Some times personal ancestor's histories or stories tell you of alternative histories that you do not get in History books.
